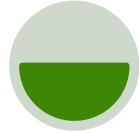

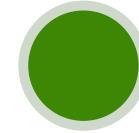

Rapid Review:

Substance Use Services with, and for Indigenous Communities*

- “What are the characteristics and approaches of substance use treatment and harm reduction services that have been (co)designed and (co)implemented with Indigenous communities?”
- Key findings:

Wholistic health and going beyond Western medicine are central to substance use programs

Collaboration with Indigenous communities translates to services rooted in Indigenous ways and knowledge

Indigeneity and culture are sources of strength and medicine

Frequent emphasis on the diversity of Indigenous communities and calls for taking the lead from them

Collaboration Process and Learnings (so far)

Planning stages

Grounding conversation: How to approach the screening & writing

- Excluding resources with no Indigenous partnership
- Integrating an asset-based approach

Write-up

Meeting with partners: Feedback and guidance on the draft

- Recognize that Indigenous communities already have many of the answers
- Name rapid reviews as a Western tool, de-colonize knowledge sharing
- Centre wholistic health: emotional, mental, physical, spiritual
- Move away from standardized models in care, build relationships first

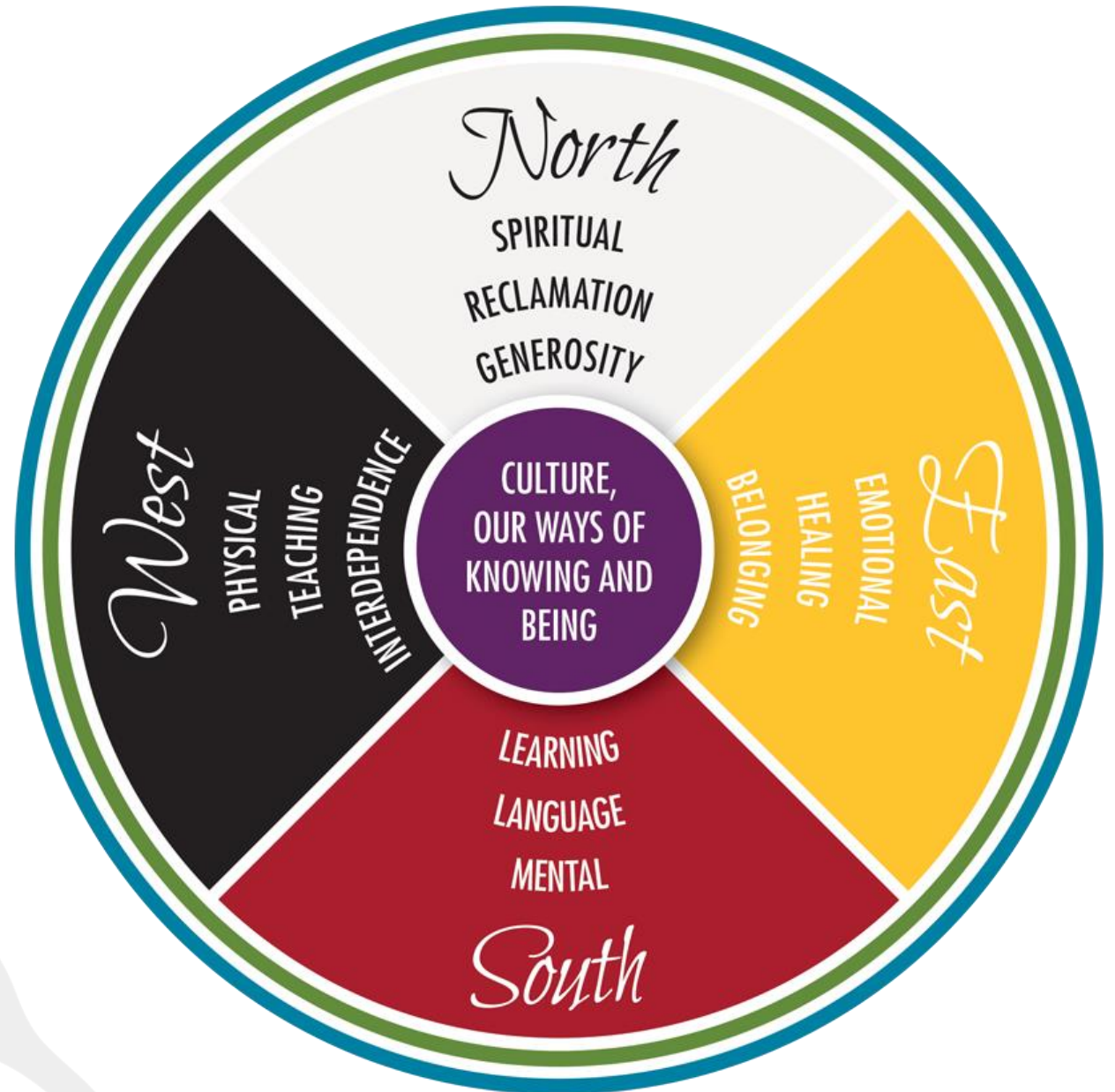
Additional un-learnings

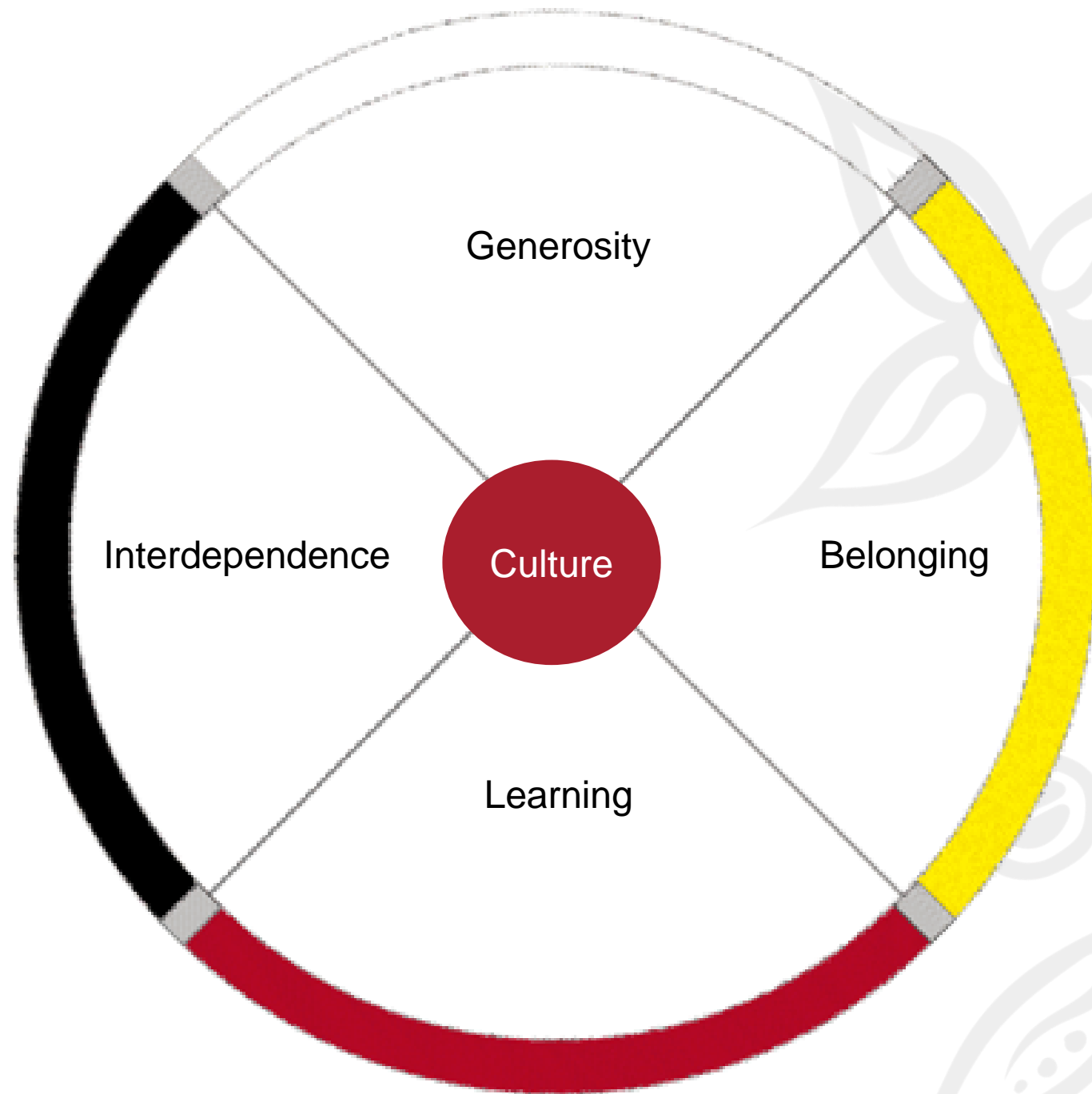
- Methodology should incorporate collaboration process
- Mainstream citation practices need to be updated to acknowledge the value and weight of narrative-based and oral knowledge
- Reviews and feedback should not be limited to a document review
